Bamboo flutes, silk strings – the aesthetics of traditional Japanese instruments also involves very noble materials. This concert will be focusing on ensemble music, the *sankyoku* (koto, shamisen and shakuhachi), a music that accompanies the singing of ancient poems in form of a duet, trio or quartet. Japanese and European masters of the Summer School will take you on a journey through an extremely refined repertoire.

Enoshima is a small island near Kamakura in Sagami Bay where Ben zai ten god is enshrined. The Japanese version of the Indian goddess Sarasvati represents everything that flows easily, like music, artistic expression and lyrics. She is considered an aquatic deity. The main part of the song is an enumeration that compares the feelings of love to seashells.
